


1315. Quoiqu'il n'ajoute rien de neuf, voici ce qu'il en dit:

« In questo mentre labonte della vita di Prochetto Salvatico, che
altre par leggo, Porchetto Salvatico, nobile Genovese pra di grandis-
sima difigione nella cetera di S. Bartolomeo di Rinaldo presso
Genova. Quivi c'ritovava al da monace professo, ed apportava
un consue non ordinario stupore ille lui alto sapere, l'unt' egli
un libro dell' Ente trini co uno e Tolla santissima Virgine Maria
(contiene manus crite, dit. d' en rete, day les dominicains de Paris) contro la
perfidia Ebraea. Ma soprattutto gli fece onore un altro libro espresso
composto contro gli stessi Ebrei. Versatissimo egli nella loro lingua
niente meno che nella vasta cognizione delle loro lettere, fecesi
d'imprimere

ad impugnare gli errori de' medesimi, non soltanto coll'autorità
 della divina scrittura, ma coi passi ancora del loro Thalmud e libri
 de' Cabalisti. Vi riuscì sì tanto felicemente in questa opera già
 data in Parigi l'anno 1570, alle stampe presso Egidio Gourmauys,
 che Agostino Guistiniano, vescovo di Nebbia, città oggi distrutta nella
 Corsica, due circa leghe distante dalla fortezza di Florenzio, impre-
 -gnò a mandarlo alla luce. In ciò s'indusse per beneficio della re-
 -pubblica cristiana, coi validamente e con ineluttabili argomenti di
 Ma non altrimenti volle s'intitolasse il no, la vittoria di Porchetto
 contro la consuetudine impia de' Giudei. (Victoria Porchetti adversus impios
 Hebraeos). Anzi s'indirizzò il Guistiniano a Guglielmo Parvo, ossia il
 piccolo (Pott) normanno di nazione, domenicano e da confessore
 di Luigi XII e Francesco I re di Francia, creato 79.° vescovo di Troyes,
 porcia passato ancora al vescovato di Sens, uomo di massiccia dot-
 trina e theologo Parigino, non incontrò, dico, difficoltà d'intenergli
 dogi, e di fargli degli encomi non comuni. Ma non fu solo in
 questo il Guistiniano, ebbe anch'andio per suoi laudatori un Giulio Bar-
 tolucchi (Cittare. Ald. in addit ad Bill. magnon, Robini'com). Un Agostino Schief-
 -fino (in Hist. eccl.). E per tralasciare cento e mille altri tutti dotti scrit-
 -tori, un Bartolomeo Paschetto (de Pulchritud. Genue). Un Fogliotta (in
 Elogiis). Un Galliano (in molleatro). Fra tanti e tanti autori però, che
 di lui fecero alla onorata memoria, niuno si attrove, che registi
 lasciate l'anno in cui s'è fiorita; ma da diversi altri nomi-
 -menti ricavasi abbastanza, che nell'anno in cui siamo (1515)
 quest'uomo grande conversasse ancora fra i viventi. e Ita bene

summam pervenerit; quae quidem pecunia in sola aedificii construc-
-tione expendi deberet. Volens propterea sine patronatus dictae
-ecclesiae et monasterii in se retinere et dici quidam dominus
et fundator. » Hactenus M. d. n. s. quae videtur exemplum a funda-
-tionis instrumento. (Vid. M. d. n. s. imprimé vol. I pag. 81-82). —

Idem fundationis annus in patrum gemensium epistola, ad nos

11 Don Carlo M^e Saisson non avendo potuto riuscire nell'acquisto della certosa di Rivarolo, volse le sue ricerche altrove, e tutto trovò un antico convento benedettino situato presso al mare, a S. Giuliano d'Albaro, paese vicino a Genova, a levante. Certo S. Rolla, che ne era proprietario, volentieri lo cedeva anche con fertilità di 10'000 lire. Carlo Alberto informatone gradì la cosa, ma non s'impegnò a nulla. S. Carlo fidando però nella generosità del Re, accettò il convento e vi si stabilì con due altri frati ed un fratello converso. Poco tempo dopo ricevette ordine dal R^o Padre di portarsi a Vienna per ivi attendere all'acquisto della certosa di Pavia. Partì dunque lasciando nel convento di S. Félix Martinet, qui s'est en partie parlé dans son autobiographie. —

Voici ce que dit D. Félix Martinet: « Dans ce temps-là, Don Charles Saisson ayant été chargé de reprendre notre Chartreuse de Rivarolo, territoire de Gènes, me prit pour son compagnon. Mais cette Chartreuse ayant été mise à la disposition de la paroisse, il a fallu y renoncer. Sur le même territoire, à Saint Julien d'Albaro, il y avait un ancien couvent de Saint Benoît, situé sur le bord de la mer. M. Rolla qui en était le propriétaire, voulut bien nous le remettre avec toutes ses propriétés, et consentoit même de faire le sacrifice de dix mille francs en notre faveur. Le Roi en témoigna son agrément sans cependant s'engager à nous aider. Don Charles se fiant néanmoins sur sa générosité, hasarda son entreprise. Il s'absenta quelque temps, et me laissa là avec un ancien profès et un frère. Assés longtemps depuis son absence,
